McDermot's First Cruise in Louisiana

Cruise Madisonville LA, from Slidell week ending October 22, 2010

The day began with a gorgeous blue sky, winds out of the SE at around 10 - 12 knots and a bare 1 ft. stirring the lake. We left the dock shortly after midday to enjoy a three day week-end in Madisonville - around 22 nautical miles (not as the crow flies) from our dock at Oak Harbour in Slidell. The town was having it's annual Wooden

Boat Festival and we wanted to check it out. On Lake Ponchartrain we passed a few sets of concrete pilings that must have had some kind of structure on them - not sure if Katrina did away with those and they were never rebuilt. We went under the I-11 Bridge and felt bad for the sail boats who had to wait because that bridge only opens on week-days with a three hour advance request. The next bridge we had to go under was the railway bridge which opened on demand - a swing bridge and it was interesting to see how it operated. Had a train been on the bridge, we would have had to wait. A series of three or four red



markers showed the way into the Tchefuncte River with the Tchefuncte River Lighthouse on shore marking the way in. Before leaving our dock in Slidell, one of the boaters on our dock advised that although the lake had



depth, we should not cut the markers because there had been a breakwater there which fell during Katrina, and was submerged just below the surface, so we followed local advice. There was an old steel barge of about 200 feet half sunken by the river's edge as we slowly made our way through the channel. Tall reeds and grass bordered the shoreline, along with one or two sunken boats, fish shacks and the like. There was no tide surge in the river but we took it slow because of the boat traffic. The river itself was surprisingly wide and our depth was showing 20 plus feet. About 6 minutes up the river, a basin opened up wide enough to accommodate the Marina Del Rey - quite large

with slips for boats ranging from a bit over 70 ft and below. The cruise took no more than 2 hours as we took it slow across the lake. We tied up in our slip, dropped the dinghy, everyone put on their life vests (a requirement

for everyone here, courtesy of the local sheriff's office), and took off to investigate the town and river by water. Zoe put up a fight with the life jacket but once the adults put on theirs, she stopped complaining in Zoe talk. On the West side we saw huge two and three story mansions with private docks. We went under HW 22 swing bridge (restricted openings) - North of the bridge boats were tied up to the municipal docks. On the East side of the river were raft-ups, each with possibly 8 - 12 boats - anchors dropped both for and aft, while further up the river some boats had lines tied from aft to the Cypress trunks on shore and anchors at the



bow. Seeing the boats was a reminder of Columbus Day but there were no naughty signs, and no nudity anywhere to be seen. The homes on both sides had private docks with boats tied up, and the raft ups were about 15 - 25 ft. off those private docks. It was interesting to see so many boats anchored in the river, both sail and power, large and small. We wanted to see how our new dinghy would perform with four and a half people on board so when we got out of the crowded waterway, we took off. The river wound it's way like a snake moving



over the ground. Houses were interspersed between the tall Cypresses, Oak trees and river reeds. Docks with benches were built on the water's edge under their overhang. The peace and quiet of the place was only interrupted by the noise of our little 15 horse engine. Our dinghy not only fit the back of our boat, but it performed well, taking us on a plane and we are greatly pleased. On our way back, we stopped at the municipal dock and walked through Main street, filled with tents, artisans, food and drink. There was a special area for kids, and Zoe had a wonderful time. We enjoyed the food - fried cat fish with sweet potato fries, jambalaya, and shrimp poboys - checked out all the old

wooden boats - some built back in the early 1800's and still moving on the waters of the US. Most of the boats had huge posters with the history of the boats written on them. There was a boat building contest going on - to end with the boats racing on the river on Sunday. The people were friendly and we had a conversation or two with the locals. On our way back we cut 4 miles off the trip going closer to the North Shore and were surprised to see an island in the lake with white sand beaches. This may be a spoil island that acts as a breakwater - we are not sure but will do some investigating later on. Our first cruise in Louisiana was a new adventure and we are already looking forward to the next one.

Of course, we are having a hard time getting used to gray water, we have not ventured to swim in it yet and George is having withdrawals from Billy's rum runners. We miss you all and will keep in touch.
