#### **Dry Tortugas**

Following Fantasy Fest in Key West last month, Sharkay and Instedda visited the Dry Tortugas and Fort Jefferson. If you have never been there, it is well worth the trip and the following information is provided in the hopes that it will be helpful to anyone planning such a trip.

The trip over to the Dry Tortugas from Key West was pleasant and enjoyable. We traveled south of the Marquesas Keys and Rebecca Shoal and then northwest between Iowa Rock and Hospital Key. The channel between Fort Jefferson and Bush Key was filled in some time ago by a storm and thus you have to enter the anchorage area via the channel west of the Fort. The anchorage area is directly in front of the Fort entrance and their dock (not for use by private boaters). While anchors hold well in the anchorage area, it can be a bit rough as we found out our first night there, with lots of rocking and rolling. However, our second night was not bad at all.

Fort Jefferson is an impressive facility. The visitor's center contains



considerable historical information about the Fort and there is a very good video/slide show presentation. You can then take a well laid out self guided tour of the facility, which includes a walk along the top of the Fort and a great view of the surrounding area. One word of caution, when you use your dingy to go from your boat to the Fort, beach it to the right of the dock, between the dock and the sea plane parking area. While there are no signs telling you to do this, if you use one of the empty boat slips

to the left of the dock, you may wind up having to go see the head Ranger to retrieve the keys to your dingy and receive a lecture on why you should not use those slips, as Captains George and Larry had to do.

Loggerhead Key, with it's light house, is located just west of Fort Jefferson and is well worth a visit. We went there by dingy with no problems. It was a bit too rough to snorkel on the Windjammer wreck located southwest of Loggerhead Key as we had planned, but we were able to visit the beautiful beach on the west side of the Key.

On our trip back from Dry Tortugas, we discovered that what we had



heard about the channel between Fort Jefferson and Rebecca Shoals sometimes being very rough was true. Even with all of the bridge windows closed, many of us still got pretty wet and it was not what you would call a fun crossing. For the return we went north of Rebecca and the Marquesas Keys, to the channel northwest of Key West. Once we passed north of Rebecca Shoals, it flattened out a bit and the remainder of the return trip was fine.

One word of caution, the waters around the lower Keys and the Marquesas Keys are loaded with crab/lobster traps. Luckily we only had to stop once to remove line from one of Sharkay's props.
