Minutes of HYC Meeting on March 1, 2010

Elliott Key

It is hard to believe that what looks from our boats like mostly a mangrove jungle was once a small community and a thriving pineapple plantation. In 1882, the Sweeting family settled on northern Elliott Key, in the vicinity of University Dock. The Sweetings were British Bahamians who moved from Harbour Island to Key West in 1866. They moved from Key West to Elliott Key because it reminded them of where they had lived in the Bahamas. They initially filed a homestead claim for 154.4 acres of land and then later bought an additional 85.4 acres, giving them nearly 240 acres of land. The Sweetings raised tomatoes and limes, but their primary crop was pineapples. Approximately 100 acres of their land was devoted to the growing of pineapples which were shipped to New York, Boston, and Key West for sale. Their homestead eventually grew into a small community of at least six family homes, two workers quarters, a small store, a packing house, a Dade County one room school house and a hurricane shelter. The fortified shelter was built on the highest spot on northern Elliott Key. They also built several docks along the ocean side of Elliott Key, where the boats would dock to pick up shipments of pineapples. Eventually the Sweetings decided to build their own boats to transport their pineapples, limes and tomatoes to market. They hired boat carpenters from Key West and brought them to Elliott Key where they built two twin mast schooners using mostly mahogany lumber cut from trees on the

island. After the hulls were built, they were fitted with temporary sails and sailed to Key West for final construction. The first vessel, the *Mt. Vernon*, was completed in 1901, weighed 49 tons and was 65 feet long. This is probably the largest schooner ever built in the Florida Keys outside of Key West. The other vessel, the *Mt Pleasant*, was built in 1902, weighed 25 tons and was 50 feet long. The Sweetings also owned two 36 foot schooners which they had bought and in 1918, they bought the *Vole*, a gas engine powered boat that they used for coastal trading and for family trips to the mainland. The Sweeting family lived on the island for approximately 50 years. Asa Sweeting, the man who filed the original homestead claim for the land, is buried on Elliott Key, almost due east of University Dock.
